The church is about helping people have right relationships with God. This certainly happens in a church building, but it also needs to happen outside the walls. Church attendance cannot be the only goal.

Already in Genesis 3:9 we see God's desire to rebuild the broken relationship with humanity. He comes looking for Adam and Eve who were hiding because of their sin. He calls out to them, "Where are you?" Matthew 15 points to God's mission to reclaim the hearts of mankind for a right relationship with Him. Jesus quotes Isaiah, saying, "This people honors me with their lips, but their heart is far from me" (Matthew 15:8).

God's mission is the salvation of all. His story of salvation includes the sending of Jesus, the Holy Spirit, and now us. Jesus says, "As the Father has sent me, even so I am sending you" (John 20:21). In all of this, we see the rebuilding of a relationship between God and mankind. If salvation is for all, it is likely that we will need to go out to the highways and byways to find people (Luke 14:23).

Apart from Jonah, the Old Testament paradigm was centripetal-

a drawing in to Israel. In the New Testament we see the church being sent out. This centrifugal movement is on display in the work of Paul. Paul's going was not easy. He was stoned and run out of town on more than one instance. He even found himself out of control in cultures where he did not understand clearly what was going on, but on he went into a world hostile to Christ.

Jesus told Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world." He had already told his disciples that we will be hated by the world (Matthew 10:22-24). Former Wheaton College president, Duane Litfin, observed that "The Christian church is no longer playing for the home team. Society is no longer rooting for the church to win." In that case, do we even want to cross our church property lines where we don't control the scenarios? Yes! We do so to point people to a relationship with Christ.

This reality of the world's reaction to Christianity should not make us yearn for the "good old days" nor to circle the wagons around our churches. This is a time for the church to get off campus and engage as never before. The world needs a Christian people that serve it. It needs the love of God in all its forms. We live in an America where only 45 percent of the population attends church monthly or more and 40 percent of millennials have ticked the "none" box. When Jesus "saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd" (Matthew 9:36). We pray for the Spirit to move us with the same compassion.



"TOWDAH" ON THANKSGIVING EVE!

Many Hebrew words are translated as "praise" in English, but each one has its own unique meaning. The word תודה (Towdah) is often translated as a "thank offering". It means, "to extend the hand in adoration, avowal, or acceptance." *TOWDAH* is thanksgiving. A confession. A sacrifice of praise. Get this: it's thanksgiving both for thanking God for things not yet received, as well as things you are ready have.

For what are you thankful? For what are you trusting God to provide for His glory and the building up of His Kingdom? Come extend your hand to God in adoration and with gratefulness for these things come *TOWDAH*—on Thanksgiving Eve, Wednesday, November 27, at 6:30 pm! And the "sacrifice of praise" part? Praise God by bringing a "sacrifice" of nonperishable food items that will be donated to a local food bank.

"For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes, to the Jew first and also to the Greek." (Romans 1:16)

What do you think of Jesus? For Steve Cohen, someone raised in a nominally Reformed Jewish home, Jesus was a Gentile god and Jews don't believe in Jesus. This understanding of Jesus is common among the Jewish community, even though "What keeps you from sharing the Gos-Jesus himself and the first Christians were Jewish! So, how did Mr. Cohen, the evangelist who joined us for a weekend-long Evangelism Seminar, change his mind?

Our Friday night session began with the lighting of Shabbat candles and blessing the One who brings forth bread from the

At this time of year, we begin planning for the coming year, 2025. I'd like to give you an overview of what this means for the Executive Council. Hopefully you're familiar with the "Council Corner" in our monthly Fully Alive newsletters, which outlines much of the Council's ongoing work.

The Executive Council ("the Council") is responsible to "coordinate and provide leadership and direction for the ministries of the congregation in order to achieve its

Steve invited attendees to recite the Apostle's Creed (which everyone did by heart). Essentially, if someone knows this



and can ask the question "What do you think of Jesus?", then they are sufficiently equipped to begin to share the Gospel with anyone around them. Anyone: a clerk at the grocery store, a random sales caller, a co-worker, a neighbor, or a stranger on the street.

After the Saturday session, attendees had the opportunity to put Steve's instruction into practice at the local farmer's market. One of the conversations led to a man receiving a copy of the Bible.

So, do you know what the person next to you thinks of Jesus? If not, why not try asking them? In doing so, it opens up space for others to Grow in God's Word and be transformed by the truth of Jesus.

RUBY'S PANTRY UPDATE

Ruby's PANTRY

Ruby's Pantry food distribution in October saw 232 cars drive through our parking lot where we distributed 385 shares, including 13 blessing shares we provide when a



family has no money. The resulting Holy Cross share from the distribution was \$929.50, which gets transferred into our CarePortal fund where we invest in our community and help even more people in need!

Thank you to all the volunteers and the leadership team who **Serve Others** by making Ruby's Pantry happen each month. You are very much appreciated in our community! We couldn't offer this amazing ministry without each one of you! God is blessing many lives through your good and faithful service.

COUNCIL CORNER: HIGHLIGHTS FROM YOUR EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Council met Tuesday: October 15, 2024

Joining Jesus "Take Ten": Discussion regarding what we see God doing in our lives and the lives of the people around us, and how we follow God's leading.

Devotions and Prayer: Keeping with the 2024 Holy Cross focus of Evangelism, Pastor Jeff shared the devotion "The Ultimate Question" based on Mark 8:29. When asked, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter answered Jesus, "You are the Messiah." The ultimate question to ask ourselves and others is, "What do you think about Jesus?"

Discipleship: Highlighted Creative Women's Gatherings, Welcome Team greeters, and plans for a New Year's Eve party in the Fellowship Hall.

Outreach Ministry: CarePortal network has served 1,472 children in Olmsted Country since February 2021 launch. Holy Cross members met 47% of September's requests. Currently there are 15 unmet requests. October's Ruby's Pop-up Pantry distributed 385 shares (including 13.2 Blessings Shares); 232 vehicles drove through.

Elders: Attendance figures reported for worship services in September: an average of 123 in person weekly; online units worshiping via hclc.tv averaged 22.

Finance: Please see Treasurer's report in this newsletter.

Trustees: Highlighted north parking lot repair completed; courtyard being aerated/ seeded and trees to be trimmed; roof maintenance to include removing leaf debris and pressure washing the flat roof.

RCLS: The same Principal call committee, from Spring/Summer 2024, has begun meeting again. 61 children are attending pre-kindergarten. The Facility manager is obtaining elevator upgrade quotes, and is rebidding the school maintenance contract.

Sanctuary Renovation Updates: Cindy presented info details on lighting, display equipment, platform, chairs, and integration materials. This included cost projections and potential future considerations. For more info, see article in this newsletter.

Business and Motions: The 2024 Ministry Plan was briefly reviewed; objectives will be evaluated at next month's meeting. Sanctuary and/or Future Projects at Holy Cross -Council approved up to \$13,000 to have an electrical study performed, Olmsted County requires this capacity evaluation.

Staffing: Council authorized leadership to pursue hiring a part-time worship leader position to work less than 20 hours/week. This was considered an immediate need to enable Cindy Wessel to support the Kidz Alive program, a vital part of Children's Ministry. Staffing options will continue to be evaluated.

TREASURER REPORT

September General Fund receipts were \$57,180, General fund expenses were \$58,858, or \$1,678 more than receipts. A single notable expense was \$7,500 for parking lot seal coating and re-striping. This is done about every three years, and the total bill was \$15,954, with \$7,454 paid by savings in designated. Absent this, September would have been a surplus.

On designated we received \$12,617 in, with additional \$6,871 coming in on Raise the Roof (\$51,741 year-to-date, and I expect about \$1,300 more through December) and \$2,200 for Keyboard replacement.

Designated spending totaled \$144,976 with the following large projects We spent

\$89,754 on roofing (\$51,741 from Raise the Roof funding), plus \$43,818 on insulation, for a total of \$133,572 on the project. These were significant, but less than initial estimates. Praise God for providing the resources to keep our space in condition bringing glory to God, and welcoming to new guests.

Parking lot seal coating was \$7,454 from savings, and additionally we had small amounts go out on other designated accounts.

Ruby Pantry receipts were\$ 9,508 and expense was \$8,652 for a surplus available to Care Portal. Care Portal offering in was \$50 and expenses were \$1,873.


