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SHARING THE GOSPEL

As a congregation we are focusing on outreach and evangelism this year. We are all aware of Christ's command to go and make disciples of all nations, and we know that we should always be prepared to give a reason for the hope that we have. That doesn't mean that it is easy or comes natural to us. We are asked to share our faith whether or not we think we have the right personality or spiritual gifts for evangelism. That is why we have engaged in the Joining Jesus training to learn more about how to create intentional relationships and opportunities for sharing the Gospel. It is also why we are inviting a teacher and trainer in evangelism to come to Holy Cross for the Apple Of His Eye Workshop September 27-29. We will be having a dinner to kick off our Workshop on Friday evening. On Saturday morning, Pastor Cohen will be leading us in some practical applications before joining us for service and Connecting Hour on Sunday morning.

In the Apple Of His Eye Training we will also be exposed to intentional outreach to the Jewish people as we explore ways to share our faith in crosscultural contexts. It is good to understand that, as a believer, it is always our responsibility to share God's love with others, and there are multiple ways to accomplish that. Just because we talk about something more challenging, like sharing our faith with strangers, doesn't mean that we should abandon our efforts to engage in relationships to help people join Jesus in His mission. Sharing the Gospel shouldn't be considered as selling anything because it is the Holy Spirit's job to bring understanding, enlightenment, and conversion. But, I think that it is a good comparison for how we share the Gospel. There are many different ways to sell something. Some people are more comfortable and capable depending on the scenario, but the more ways that you are trained to sell your product, the more opportunities you will have. If you are selling a product, there are social media, telemarketing, advertising, door to door, and product demonstrations at workplaces. There are networking and relationship strategies. The church should be more adept and capable at sharing the Gospel than the world is at selling goods and services, but that is often not the case.

Regardless of your giftings and of your preferred method of sharing the Gospel, please do not discount any opportunity to hear about how you can more effectively talk to others about your Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. Going and making disciples is one of the last things that Jesus ever said before He ascended into heaven. Don't let it be one of the things you never do.

I hope that as we have been walking through the book of Revelation, there has been a repeated theme of the urgency that is required for sharing the Gospel in the last days. There is very little that will matter more than that for all of eternity. Take the opportunity and make it a priority today to learn how to share your faith, pray for unbelievers, make relationships with those outside of the church, and attempt to do what Christ has commanded. I hope to see you at the Apple Of His Eye Workshop!

The Call process is one way in which our church and her church workers are connected. Our practice differs from other denominations around us. In the Assemblies of God church, pastors reach out to other churches and apply for pastoral openings which have been publicly shared. > A church, seeking to fill a pastoral vacancy, extends a Call to a worker within the Church. The Called worker then humanly considers God's work in each congregation, the needs of each congregation, and implications upon his family. God accomplishes His work through these ways in which His capital "C" Church is connected. As a result, every Call is considered a Divine Call; the Holy Spirit leads churches to connect with pastors.

In regards to the Divine Calls laid before me, you have been gracious in allowing Katie and myself time to discern the Holy Spirit's leading. Thank you for your encouragement, thanksgiving, and prayers. At this point, the only Call I have accepted is that to Holy Cross as Associate Pastor.

Do be aware, there are churches that need a shepherd. It was reported in April of 2023 that 571 of the 5,842 LCMS congregations were calling pastors. With that in mind, I continue to ask for your prayers. Pray for all churches that seek to fill pastoral vacancies. Pray for Katie and myself as we discern the Spirit's leading. Pray that the Lord accomplishes His tasks with the people whom He sends.

CHURCHFRONT WORSHIP MINISTRY COACHING

Holy Cross Worship Ministries are halfway through our 12-month coaching contract with Churchfront. The three high-level goals the sound in the Sanctuary, Parish Hall, for our work include Excelling in Worship, Development of Team Leaders, and the Sanctuary Upgrade Initiative.

We are using devotions during PraiseHym rehearsals and other means to encourage consistent spiritual growth for all Worship Ministries volunteers. Upcoming training with Churchfront coach Luke Jackson is scheduled for the end of August. This will include helping PraiseHym members grow both musically and in engaging with God and the congregation during our corporate worship. The training will also help Sounds

for Christ and Livestream Audio teams provide even more consistent excellency in and on hclc.tv.

Holy Cross is utilizing Churchfront for recruiting and training of more team members for the Worship Technologies teams. Specifically, Sights for Christ is working to transition to a different software (ProPresenter) for our visual display system. The new software provides powerful automations and integrations with audio, song lyrics, scripture text, and Sanctuary lighting.

Churchfront is walking alongside Holy

Cross in the Sanctuary Upgrade Initiative as well. They have provided helpful input regarding improved lighting in the sanctuary, re-designing the platform, placement and type of screens, and considerations regarding the audio coverage of the sanctuary. When the time comes that we believe God is leading us to move forward in this project, Churchfront with help us purchase and install new equipment and train our teams on the new technology.

Please continue to pray that God will grow Holy Cross to excel in our worship of Him, exalting, magnifying, glorifying Almighty God through Jesus Christ!

CHOSEN LIFEGROUPS



"Welcome to church." This announcement is made at every worship service. But, just what is church? One definition is, "The church is God's people, graciously brought into a relationship with the triune God and one another after being selected by the Father." None of us at Holy Cross are here by accident. We were graciously brought into this body of believers. The number of guests that cross our threshold each Sunday has been consistent. The entire congregation needs to take part in creating a welcoming atmosphere. How does that happen?

A person feels welcome when someone has gone out of their way to introduce themselves and ask at least one question. Imagine the church as a laboratory where we are free to experiment with different methods on how to best meet people we have not met before. Can we all admit that

meeting strangers at church and in our neighborhoods can be a struggle sometimes? So, what do we do? More often than not, we avoid being intentional about meeting people for the first time. What if we all make a goal to meet at least one person who is a stranger to us at each worship service? Do you think that would help people feel more welcome at Holy Cross?

Here are some suggestions as you practice hospitality:

- Start the conversation with, "I don't think I've met you" rather than, "Are you new here?"
- · Introduce yourself first. You just need to use your first name.
- Ask them their name(s) and really focus on remembering their first names.
- · Think of one question that can serve as a conversation starter, such as "How long have you been worshipping at Holy Cross?"
- In your short conversation, try to repeat their first name at least once.

This month, we have four "Chosen" Life-Groups starting with the goal of viewing and discussing Season 4 of "The Chosen." In order to get to know one another, everyone in the small group needs to feel welcome.

Our Monday morning men's Bible Study (that meets at Charlies Restaurant) recently read the text in 1 Corinthians 11 starting at verse 17. The church in this text-when celebrating the Lord's Supper-didn't care if others felt welcome. They didn't share their food. Some used this meal to enjoy too much wine. Perhaps some Jewish converts didn't mingle with the Gentile converts. St. Paul's instruction is that they are all part of one body. If they eat and drink the Lord's Supper without paying attention to the rest of the body, they could never be a blessing to the Father or to one another.

"Welcome to church." Whose responsibility is this? Everyone who has been graciously brought into a relationship with the triune God and one another is responsible. We are a church with the mission to be "Helping People Know, Live, and Share the Love of Christ".

RCLS is pleased to welcome several new teachers for this upcoming school year:



A DIVIDED NATION

"First of all, I urge that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made for all people, for kings and all who are in high positions, that we may lead a peaceful and quiet life, godly and dignified in every way. This is good, and it is pleasing in the sight of God our Savior ... " 1 Timothy 2: 1-3

Recent events in our nation's life have revealed the sad results of a perpetually heated and vitriolic political environmentan assassination attempt on a presidential candidate. Sadly, our nation is no stranger to such hatred and acrimony and its destructive results. As Christian citizens, we are called to a higher standard. We are to love people and use politics, not the other way around. When Christians engage in malicious exchanges in the public square, it only demeans the Christian witness in the eyes of a jaded public. We are to refrain from vehemence, hatred, and any sinful behaviors, digital or otherwise, even as we participate in the political process and engage our civic duty with a good conscience. We are to be salt and light in a world of darkness and animosity (Matt.

5:13-14).

As we do, we must remember we are bound to the word of God, not a political party, nor any one candidate. As the Psalmist says, "Put not your trust in princes, in a son of man, in whom there is no salvation." (Psalm 146:3). Christians recognize that no one political candidate has all the right answers; it's wrong to view anyone in messianic terms, blindly elevating him or her to god-like status. Instead, the Apostle Paul directs us to esteem and pray for rulers and those in high positions, that all members of society may lead a peaceful and quiet life, dignified in every way. To that end, many pastors and congregations of the district are offering prayer services. I encourage you to attend as you are able. Then, continue to pray. The words of the litany offer specific petitions for our nation and leaders that you might use (Lutheran Service Book, p. 288):

L: To give to all peoples concord and peace; to preserve our land from discord and strife; to give our country Your protection in every time of need; To direct and defend our president and all in authority; to Minnesota South District bless and protect our magistrates and all

our people; To watch over and help all who are in danger, necessity, and tribulation ...; and to have mercy on us all:

C: We implore You to hear us, good Lord.

L: To forgive our enemies, persecutors, and slanderers and to turn their hearts; to give and preserve for our use the kindly fruits of the earth; and graciously to hear our prayers:

C: We implore You to hear us, good Lord.

The word of God must be our guide as we engage with those whose political passions are running hot. May you see your fellow citizens first and foremost not as 'Democrat' or 'Republican' but rather someone Christ loved to death, even death on the cross. The Lord grant you courage and wisdom to be salt and light as a Christian who lives as a citizen in a troubled and divided country.

COUNCIL CORNER: HIGHLIGHTS FROM YOUR EXECUTIVE COUNCIL

Council met on Tuesday: August 20, 2024

Joining Jesus: Council "Took Ten" and shared responses to some of the 5 questions from Dwelling 1:14.

Devotions and Prayer: Our focus for Holy Cross in 2024 is evangelism. Pastor Jeff shared the devotion "Sound Barriers" with 1 Thes. 2:2. Paul was emboldened by God to speak the Gospel, in spite of opposition. Sound Barriers include not talking, not talking about spiritual matters, not sharing the Gospel, or if you do...not asking for their response. Reflect on the conversations you are having with those you've

been praying for, and plan on breaking the next barrier with them.

Finance and Trustees: Please note the August Treasurer's report and the Trustees (Facilities) info in this newsletter.

Elders: Attendance figures reported for worship services in August: an average of 121 in person weekly; online units worshiping via hclc.tv averaged 25.

Discipleship: The Welcome/Greeters Team is looking for one more couple to help with Hospitality on Sunday mornings. Please see Karen Hutton or Sherri Emedo.

Outreach Ministry: August 10 Ruby's Popup Pantry distributed 328 shares; 210 vehicles drove through. Currently there are 17 CarePortal requests with unmet needs. Please pray for the families in need.

Online Security Update: Council discussed unwanted solicitations and scams that could occur involving members and staff. Diane Straka described additional controls put in place to prevent such events.

Motion: Council approved the Handbook Review Process and Timing document that lists a schedule to review/approve handbooks.

July receipts were near average at \$49,469 (\$12,367/week). Budget need is about \$12,769/week. July expenses were in line with expectations, and \$1,476 below receipts. This was expected, as there are no RCLS Tuition Assistance payments

in June and July (about \$2,000/mo.).

\$2,213 designated gifts came in on Raise the Roof, bringing the total to \$42,856 on the \$53,000 pledged. \$355 was received for Suresh. \$677 of courtyard funds were

spent and \$466 of Garden funds were transferred to CarePortal.

Cash Balance in checking is \$76,760 and \$196,474 in savings. LCEF funds in Certificates of Deposit with LCEF are \$85,418 (Regedahl). Additionally we have \$111.838 in money market and T-bills at Stifel. In September a large portion of savings and investments will be used for the roof project, insulation, and rear parking area resurfacing.
